This regional identity was s strong and important element of pride and motivation through the vast campaigns of the First World War. The current 13 Field Squadron, which celebrated its centenary in 2012, traces its linage to the raising of a Western Australian engineer company. It remains proudly a Western Australian engineer unit.

I commend this book for the way that it has organised the historical facts about units, places, dates, activities and most importantly people. These facts have been tied together with historical photographs, maps and honour rolls. The book provides the necessary detail upon which to appreciate the efforts of the men and women who served as Sappers from and in Western Australia, in the past and to the present day.
