Engineers of creative thinking

13 BDE in Western Australia has evolved from a part-time workforce brigade into a test bed for innovation and modernisation across Army.

The bridgade's 13ER, officially raised at Irwin Barracks in July, has now added its second squadron, the specialist 22 Engr Sqn, as a STEM incubator with capabilities including rapid fabrication, robotics and decision support.

13ER Acting Commander Lt-Col Michael Hadlow said 13 Bde had been propelled to the forefront of Army's modernisation, transformation and innovation program.

"By enhancing engineering capabilities in Western Australia, Army is harnessing the population's potential in the region, while increasing Army's ability to respond to domestic operations," Lt-Col Hadlow said.

The IXG/MakerSpace lab has been integrated into 22 Engr Sqn, providing a 'think hub' of design and prototyping for 13 Bde members.

MakerSpace, at Irwin Barracks, is equipped with a workshop, electronics

lab and 3D printers. It is open to all services and encourages innovation, non-linear thinking and idea sharing.

In another first for Army, six reservist specialist service officers were appointed through the BHP/Army Workforce Mobility Trial.

The trial's bespoke training program fast-tracks recruitment by mapping specialist skillsets into an Army reservist position and creating a shared workforce model between the two organisations.

The new recruits have started their military journey in 22 Engr Sqn and will bring a real-world mindset to Army and the broader Defence network.

Commander 13 Bde Brig Brett Chaloner said an integrated Defence system in Western Australia was critical in an increasingly unstable global environment.

"Enhancing partnerships and habitual collaboration with industry and academia, providing military-based solutions, including rapid prototyping and fabrication, to real-world issues makes us stronger together," Brig Chaloner Providing militarybased solutions, including rapid prototyping and fabrication, to realworld issues and threats, makes us stronger together.

Of the 2.434 Australian and British servicemen held in Sandakan POW camp only 6 Australians survived the POW camp and the death march.
