Stuart was a serving sapper when he passed away, filling the position as the Executive Officer of 11 Engineer Regiment in Qld.

Brig Ian David Stock passed away on 1 January 2017 aged 88 years. Ian was OC 22 Const Sqn from 1957 to 1959. After discharge, he joined the CMF and was OC 13 Fd Sqn from 1963 to 1965. Ian was promoted to Brigadier when posted as commander of 2 Task Force.

John Edward (Jack) O'Sullivan passed away on 3 January 2017. Jack was aged 100 years and 9 months. Jack served with the 2/2 Forestry Company in Scotland and as a physical training instructor at Wagga Wagga during WWII. Jack joined the AIF in 1940 and was discharged in 1945. After the war, Jack had a 30 year distinguished career with the WA Police Force. Jack was an honorary member of the Association.

<u>John Roland (Jack) Benari</u>



Jack Benari was born on 12th February 1923 in Mooney Ponds, Victoria. His family moved to Perth not long after he was born and lived in Nedlands. He has two sisters who were born in Perth. He attended Nedlands Primary School and Claremont Central High School. His first job after leaving school at aged 14 was as a newspaper office boy.

In January 1940, Jack joined the Militia and remained

with the Militia until 1942 when he volunteered to join the RAAF and do his bit in the war. After having his enlistment held up, he joined the Army in June 1942 and was allocated to the RAE.

Jack was posted to the Training Battalion in Northam before joining 7 Army Troops Company in 1943. In July the Unit moved to Northern Australia carrying out works around Alice Springs, Mt Isa, Elliot, Tennant Creek, Derby and Wyndham.

In December 1944, the Unit moved to the RAE Training Depot at Kapooka before going to Bougainville in April 1945 where they maintained the 7th Division base area at Torokina and operated the water, power and refrigeration systems, as well as general base maintenance and providing assisting the 2/2 Forestry Company.

Jack returned to Australia in late 1945 and was discharged in January 1946. He returned to work at the Newspapers until he resigned a couple of years later and joined the Public Health Department.

In May 1950, Jack married Dorothy Cooper and they lived in the Hollywood/Nedlands area. They have 4 sons who all live and work in the eastern states with their families.

Jack and Dorothy were living in Nedlands when he retired in 1963. They currently live in Bentley.

From 1953, Jack was an active member of the 7 Army Troops Coy (RAE) Association until it closed in 2011 when he joined the RAE Association.

RAE Association Member Gets Involved Chidlow - RSLWA's new sub-branch

Chidlow is going ahead full steam with its Chidlow & District Returned & Services League (RSL) Sub-Branch as it was presented with its Charter by the State President of RSLWA Peter Aspinall, on Sunday, November 6, 2016.

Before he handed over the Charter to Mr Aspinall to present, CEO Mr John McCourt said: "It's not common these days to welcome a brand new RSL subbranch and Mr President, this is the 133rd sub-branch."

It's hard to believe that this quiet, little place, nestling in the Perth Hills with Lake Leschenaultia, was at one time a bustling hive of training activity for army troops destined for the 'front'.

In fact, Lake Leschenaultia was originally created in 1898 as a railway reserve from where water was pumped into the station yard water towers. The village hall was the recruitment centre and also where the 'medicals' took place.

It is the preservation of Chidlow's military history that will be included in future projects of the new sub-branch as well as the completion of an ANZAC memorial hopefully in time for ANZAC Day 2017.

The driving force for these projects, Mr W. O. (Bill) Scrivener, who is President of the Chidlow Sub-Branch said that he

Mr Scrivener said that he is not surprised an RSL is so popular due to Chidlow's strong military connections going back to the First World War.

"More than 80 locals received honourable mention during both wars and 12 did not return," he said.

"The CPA learnt recently how important the Chidlow Army Camp was to Australia's defence during the Second World War. Chidlow, (formerly Chidlow's Well) was chosen for its geographical position and for military and strategic advantages. Sharing this experience and Chidlow's military history will ensure its preservation for future generations."

6 Engineer Support Regiment

6 ESR are living up to the Corps motto of "Ubique" with Sappers deployed to the Middle East, PNG, Cultana (SA) and Laura (FNQ).

Laura, a small community town with a population of 70 - 100 people more than doubled in size when 150 sappers descended on the town for AACAP 2016.Led by 17 Const Sqn and ably assisted by East Timorese, Papua New Guinean and Tongan engineers, work included building a waste water treatment system, a multi-purpose facility, a roof over the outdoor basketball court, 1000 metres of footpaths and a number of smaller projects including two new football ovals.



The new waste water treatment system will collect excess water from existing septic tanks and waterlogged backyards and move it to a common treatment area outside of town. It will make a huge difference to the environment health and living conditions of Laura.



The multi-purpose facility will provide the town with a space that could be used by everyone. It has a training room, three office spaces, two storage rooms and a large veranda area that could be used for community outdoor activities and meetings.



The basketball roof will allow children at the Laura school to have a safe playing area away from the midday sun and provides an optional area for outdoor activities in the wet season
