After completing his 6 years obligatory service Peter left the Army as a Cpl and began a career as a Marine Electrical Engineer on the MV Cape Don supplying lighthouses from Esperance to our NW and as far as Groote Elyandt, in the Gulf of Carpentaria.

John Dillon passed away on 12 October 2017 aged 81 years and 5 months. He joined the Army as a 7th Intake Army Apprentice C&J in 1952. He was a member of 22 Const Sqn from 1955 - 1962. John joined the Department of Works in 1962 as a building supervisor and remained with them until he retired. John and Neville Clark were mates at the Apprentices School and 22 Const Sqn. John was a past president of the Ex 22 Association.

Kevin Myers passed away on 13 November 2017 aged 84 years and 6 months. He was called up for National Service and joined 44 Rlwy Sqn. When the Unit closed he joined 13 Fd Sqn and was promoted Lt soon after joining. In 1962, with the expansion of 22 Const Sqn, Kevin was the Tp Comdr of the CMF Tp that became 3Tp, 22 Const Sqn. Kevin was a member of the Association.

Ken Barker passed away on 22 November 2017 aged 82 years and 10 months. Ken served in Vietnam from January to December 1970 as Sgt with 1 Fd Sqn and 17 Const Sqn

Matthew Carroll_passed away on 30 November 2017 aged 73 years and 6 months. Matt served in Vietnam from June 1966 to May 1967 with 581 Sig Tp and from December 1968 to October 1969 with 1 Fd Sqn. He was also a member of 22 Const Sqn in 1970/71.

JAMES FRANCIS (JIM) KIMBERLEY



Jim was born in Bruce Rock on 1 March 1941 and had three brothers and two sisters. The family moved to Gosnells, where he attended Gosnells Primary. They then moved to Belmont where he attended St Annes and later St Patricks.

Jim was 14 years old when he started work on the roads in the southwest with his father.

In January 1961, he joined the Australian Regular Army Special Reserve and after recruit and Corps training was posted to 1 Fd Sqn. In March 1963 he was posted to 4 Tp

RAE, BCFESR and in November of that year was transferred to 2 Tp, Indep Fd Sqn.

On his return from Malaya in March 1965, Jim was posted to 22 Const Sqn as a Spr FE/Dvr. He did a tour of duty to Borneo with the Sqn from June to December 1966. Whilst with 22 Const Sqn he was discharged from the ARASR in January 1967 and the next day enlisted in the ARA Supplement. He remained with the Sqn until 1969 and during that time was promoted up to T/Sgt.

In November 1969, he was posted to 17 Const Sqn, SVN and in June 1970 was transferred to the AATTV until he returned to the Sqn that year after a 12-month tour of duty.

In January 1975, Jim was posted to SME as WO2 Asst Instr, in 1977 was posted to 3 FER as SSM, then transferred to LWC as an instructor in the WO Training Wing. In December 1980, he was posted back to 22 Const Sqn as SSM on promotion to WO1.

Jim had the honour of being posted to 22 Const Sqn as a Sapper and 15 years later being posted back to the same Sqn as WO1 SSM.

On his return from Vietnam, Jim met Judith McComish nee Hovey and in 1972 they married, and Jim inherited 3 step children, 1 boy and 2 girls who he treated as his own children.

Jim took discharge in January 1982 and worked with Main Roads WA as a Technical Officer. Jim and family lived in Bedford until he finally retired from active work and he and Judy moved to Glen Forrest where they remained until Jim passed away on 27 September 2017 aged 76 years and 7 months.

Geoff was born in Naracoorte, SA in 1953. He has 5 sisters and 1 brother (dec aged 14 mths). He attended Naracoorte and Pt Augusta Primary Schools and Naracoorte High School.

He left home at the age of 16 and undertook itinerant work in SA and Vic. In 1970 at the age of 17 he joined the Army and served in Reinforcement wing at SME, HQ RAE 3 Div and spent 4 years with 22 Const Sqn, taking discharge in 1976.

One of the memorable moment of his career was finishing in the top 5 students of a Subject A & C promotion course, the other 4 top students were SASR Troopers.

After leaving the Army, Geoff worked in the music industry, IT (Micrographics) industry and is currently the Business Development Manager with Toner Plus.

Geoff married Sandra Sampson in Ballarat, Victoria in 1976 and they have 2 girls and 2 boys and 4 grandchildren. They currently live in Wanneroo.

Where Our Association Started (Part 2)

From after World War 2 to June 1989, there is very little known about the happenings of the Association during that time as there are no minutes or other documents available for that period.

What we do know is that in 1948 the Royal Australian Engineers Ex-Services Association was formed and Victor (Vic) Steffanoni was the President and William (Bill) Robinson was the Secretary.

When Roy Abbott was appointed the grounds curator at the West Australian Cricket Association, it was decided that all meetings would be held at the WACA where members would have access to the Association facilities.

In 1961, the Perth branch of the Commonwealth Bank wrote to the Secretary of the Ex-Services Association of Engineers and Allied Units advising him the bank account had not been operated on since 1940 and that any funds in the account would be transferred to a Depositor's Unclaimed Fund.

The Secretary informed the bank that the Association was no longer operating and requested that any monies in the account be transferred to the new Association which had opened an account at the Commonwealth Bank branch in Mt Hawthorn. The amount of sixteen pound, one shilling and nine pence was transferred into that account on 11 July 1961.

A copy of the first Constitution was adopted by the Association in 1988. A copy which has been fastened to the first page of the minute book used to record the minutes of the first meeting in 1989. It is not known when the Royal Australian Engineers Ex-Services Association changed its name, but the Constitution has the heading 'Royal Australian Engineers Association of Western Australia', our current title.

The first recorded minutes were of the Annual General Meeting held on 11th June 1989. The meeting was held at the Washington Street depot in Victoria Park. T Davey and Ron Beard were elected President and Secretary respectively.

Meetings were held at Washington Street until 1992 when 13 Field Squadron moved back into Irwin Barracks and into the old 22 Construction Squadron buildings.

At the June 1989 AGM, it was moved that annual subscriptions be raised from \$4.00 to \$10.00 commencing from 1 June 1990.

At the July 1989 committee meeting, Brian O'Toole, who was an active member of the NSW Sappers Association at the time, reported that in 1987 the NSW Sappers Association had approached the National Corps Committee of their proposal to bring all Engineer Associations together in a National body.

As no reply was received from the National Corps Committee, the Sappers Association of NSW along with the Old Sappers Association of Victoria proposed to form the nucleus of a National Association and invite other Engineer Associations to join them. A Constitution had even been drawn up for the new National Association. The committee decided to hold the matter of registration over until more information was available.

In the 1989 Edition of the "Sapper" magazine, the National Corps Committee decided to proceed to establish a National RAE Association however in February 1990 it was decided not to proceed, and the matter was dropped.

In 1994, the Association applied to the Department of Commerce and Consumer Protection to become and Incorporated Association. This was approved and on the 8th December 1994 and the Association became known as the "Royal Australian Engineers Association of Western Australia (Incorporated)".

At the AGM held on 9th June 1996, the membership fees were raised to \$15.00 and remained at that until the AGM in 2003 when they were raised to \$20.00. Fees have not changed since then.

At the February 1999 General Meeting and many years of painstaking work, Harry Hickson announced that the new "Banner" was completed and on display. In October 2003, a timber frame was installed and fixed to the wall of the Ryan Club to house the "Banner". The original Banner was donated to the Tasmanian RAE Association in 2005.

At the 1999 AGM a vote was taken to change the name of the "The Devil's Inn". With all members present agreeing, the boozer became the "Ryan Club".

The Association for some time published a newsletter but in February 2000, Mick Ryan, who was then President, published the first "Purple Circle".

Back in 1998, Warwick Broomfield was given the task of designing an Engineer Memorial and his design was presented to the Association and approved. Work started almost immediately and was completed at the beginning of 2000. On ANZAC Day 2000 the Memorial was officially opened and consecrated by Chaplin Howard Eaton.

Since that day, the Memorial Precinct has been the place the Association and 13 Fd Sqn have held ANZAC Day services to honour past sappers who have paid the ultimate price in war.

The only upgrade to the Memorial has been the placing of the new granite plinth and bronze slouch hat.

Prior to 2001, the Waterloo Dinner was celebrated by serving and retired Officers and by serving and retired senior NCO's, each in their respective Mess dining room. As numbers of each group started to dwindle the event was combined to be an Officers and senior NCO's dining in night.

With the closure of 22 Const Sqn and the further decline in retired numbers, it was decided that the Waterloo Dinner held in June 2001 would be an "All Ranks" event and has continued as such ever since.

At the June 2003 AGM the Association received a donation for the sole purpose of setting up a Welfare Fund to help sapper's and their families in a time of need. With

the support of a benefactor and fundraising by the Association, the Welfare Fund is still operating.

After many hours of sketching and drawing, Spr Ian Coate presented to the Association/13 Fd Sqn at the 2004 AGM, the painting "100 Years of Engineering" which is displayed on the back wall of the Ryan Club.

Over the period from 1926 to today, a period of 92 years, the Association has had 3 titles (1 title pre-WW2), 15 Presidents (2 pre-WW2), 7 Secretaries (2 pre-WW2) and 11 Life Members.

The longest serving President was Michael Ryan who held the position for 23 years and the longest serving Secretary were Hugh O'Doherty and Neville Clark who held the position for 22 years.
